## It's Business As Usual... Virtually


As lockdown restrictions are set to continue for the next few months, our councillors have been meeting virtually as scheduled. ## SID on Arthington Lane

Since the Speed Indicator Device, known as SID, was installed outside the Wharfedale Pub on Arthington Lane, we have been monitoring data of vehicles travelling past and the speed at which they were travelling.

As the pie chart below shows, the most recent data reports the majority of vehicles (56%) were traveling at 31-40mph. 34% were travelling at 21-30mph and 6% at 41-50mph. The small blue section records speeds of less than 20mph.

The police are also including the Lane as part of their regular speed checks in an attempt to reduce the amount of speeders passing through our village.



## Bench on Black Hill Road

Local cyclists and ramblers may have noticed that the bench at the bottom of Black Hill Road has disappeared; the parish council are in the process of replacing it as the old one became unsafe. Watch this space!

## Did You Know... Arthington Parish & Breary

Although the parish of Arthington still stretches up the side of the Wharfe valley to the Creskelds and Breary Lane East it once included land as far south as Golden Acre Park. The 1909 OS map shows a finger of Arthington parish on the top and southern section of Creskeld Lane, proceeding along what is now Jubilee Copse and then spreading out to include Breary Marsh (south of the The Sycamores), Marsh Lane (Kings Road) and the northern banks of Marsh Beck, the stream which runs through Golden Acre. Information from the 1881 census also shows that these areas were part of Arthington Parish.

Gamekeeper William Child, aged 48 years, his wife Hannah, aged 46, and their 5 children aged between 21 and 8 years were living on Marsh Lane (now Kings Road). Their 21 year old son Arthur was a gardener and his 4 younger sisters were scholars.

Living at Breary Marsh were 69 year old Joseph Hobson, an unemployed road labourer and his wife Ellen aged 72 years, and in another dwelling agricultural labourer Thomas Inman, aged 29 years, and his wife Sophia, aged 24 years.

Located near what is now the cafe at Golden Acre was Black Hill Well Farm. The farm residents were Alfred Stubbs aged 47 years, a farm bailiff of 35 acres employing three men, his wife Ruth, aged 53 years, and their five children aged between 22 and 12 years. Daughter Pheobe, aged 18, was a dressmaker and her sister Martha, aged 15 years, was a pupil teacher. The household also included 19 year old Thomas Abbott a general labourer.

The southern section of Creskeld Lane, Breary Marsh and the area around Marsh Lane remained in Arthington parish until 1937 when some 300 acres from 'Breary' were brought into the parish of Bramhope.
